Pros and Cons of Graduate School

Pros:	Cons:		
> Higher earning potential	> Slow return on investment potential		
> Research opportunities	 Stressful Forced to juggle a lot of responsibilities 		
> Enhance your education	 Can sometimes take a long time to complete 		
 Access to advanced tools and equipment 	 Expensive and funding is not always guaranteed 		
> Realization of interests	> Competitive

Benefits of starting grad school immediately



Benefits of working for a while before grad school

- Accustomed to being a student
 have momentum
- Study skills are sharp
- Might have fewer obligations
- Some industries require an advanced degree even for "entry-level" positions

- Better idea of career goals and interests
- Able to bring more experience to your education
- Some employers may pay for you to go back to school
- Time to save up financially
- Can improve your chances of being accepted
 - Especially if your undergrad transcript was not very competitive



What type of degree?

Master's

- > 1-3 years
- Sometimes required for a professional degree
- Some designed for employment advancement
- Others designed for intellectual growth and experience

Professional degree

- > 2-5 years
- Doctor of Medicine (MD), Juris Doctor (JD), Doctor of Osteopathy (DO)
- Stress practical application of knowledge and skills
- Focus on gaining experience

Doctorate

- > 3-6 years
- Highest possible degree
- Advancing knowledge through original research


Determining Your Graduate School Best Fit

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Letters of Recommendation

Tips:

- > Start early
- Be intentional about who you ask
 - Past or current professors
 - Employers
 - Mentors
 - Advisers
- > Be formal and polite
- > Give as many details as possible
 - Better instructions and information = better letter of rec

Personal Statement

Quick Tips

- > Schools are interested in the following:

 - Who are you?
 What are you interested in and why?
 Why are you applying to this institution?
- > Start by highlighting 3 personal attributes that make you a unique or successful candidate and link them to relevant experience (jobs, internships, projects)
 - Connect this to specific aspects of the program (research opportunities, program structure, connections with community partners) and how they align with your short and long term goals

- > Give yourself time to get all transcripts together
- Try to meet with faculty or advisers from prospective schools
- > Talk to current students
- > Look at prerequisites early
 - Gives you time to take classes you may need
- > Don't be afraid to apply to certain programs
 - Even if you are missing some prerequisites



Funding: the important topic that isn't discussed enough

How much does it cost?

Cost Breakdown

Resident Quarterly tuition (<18 credits): • Fall 2020: \$6,504 • Winter 2021: \$6,590 • Spring 2021: \$6,590 Total: \$19,684 Nonresident Quarterly tuition (<18 credits): • Fall 2020: \$11,369 • Winter 2021: \$11,455 • Spring 2021: \$11,455 Total: \$34,279

Example from UW 2020-2021

Things to note:

- Other schools may be more or less expensive
- Tuition drastically increases if you take more than 18 credits
- Does not include rent or other basic needs
- Much more expensive than undergrad

- > Research Assistant (RA)
- > Scholarships
- > Program funding
- > Employers
- > Financial Aid
- > Loans
- > Jobs

UW financial resources:

- Graduate Funding Information Service (GFIS)
 - They have a funding and grant writing workshop


